From our Manager

There is no wrong door here at SunnyKids. Who would we be to push away, instead of applauding the decision to make a change? To guide, to support, to encourage- that is the goal.

Another year at SunnyKids. More families, volunteers, and organisations to join our village and work towards a future where women and children are free from family and domestic violence. I see individuals at all stages of their journeys- the calm before the storm, the spring that follows winter, the aftermath of cataclysmic events.

All those moments have their place in their move towards making the changes they wish to see. In the calm moments they prepare and build strength, in the spring they rebuild and look to make change, and in the aftermath they find resilience and a reserve of courage to access for the long road ahead.

A word that comes to mind for this year is GROWTH. The Sunshine Coast has recognised the firm hold and devastating effects of domestic and family violence in our community, and has graciously supported us to expand our horizons, ensuring the cycle of DV can be broken. Our SKIS program has been extended to children in early education (SKEE); the earlier a child and their family are supported, the more likely that inter-generational cycles of poverty and disadvantage can be broken. For the first time since it opened, our Cooroy Family Support Centre will now be open five days a week. Earlier this year we were the grateful recipients of the Mingle with the Mayor Charity ball; due to the hard work and tireless efforts of the Noosa Mayor Clare Stewart and Noosa Circle Organising Committee and businesswoman Josanne Falla amongst many others, SunnyKids will be expanding services in Noosa Shire. More women, children and families who may otherwise have not had that necessary support to make life-changing choices will now be able to reach out.

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Our reason for existence

SunnyKids connects people and coordinates services for vulnerable Sunshine Coast families in order to make meaningful change.

The Sunshine Coast community identifies up to 5,000 vulnerable and at-risk children every year. When children and families need help, they present to SunnyKids via self-referral, referral by schools, community agencies or statutory authorities, with the most prominent issues being domestic and family violence, mental health and substance use.

Through our own resources and programs as well as in partnership with government, private and community sectors we take a holistic approach to solving problems.

SunnyKids is able to identify what a family needs and where to find the right services to deliver positive, life-changing solutions.

Issues can be complicated and the systems complex, but our Service Delivery team knows how to navigate the network to support families with their immediate and ongoing needs. Including but not limited to emergency accommodation, psychology services, school support systems, legal and police support, literacy programs, relocation services, health and wellbeing, financial support, mentors and more.

SunnyKids is here to make sure those who need help can get it and emerge stronger, happier and healthier into their own new support village.

Our underlying, driving belief is that any issue is not the child's problem to fix, nor is it the family's or society's problem alone.

We believe it takes a village to provide the right environment for children to thrive and we are grateful for the support of generous Sunshine Coast residents, businesses and groups who donate funds, time and resources to enable SunnyKids to provide the greatest impact possible.

The last 12 months have been both challenging and monumental for Sunnykids. Again, I am honoured to have been part of the Sunnykids Village.

COVID-19 continued to impact our events which is a major source of income. We rely heavily on the generosity of our supporters and the local community. Having said this, we have had incredible results and managed to increase support across all our services, including our outreach support at Cooroy Family Support Centre. This Centre is now open 5 days a week. This was only made possible from the generous support of the Noosa community.

We were lucky enough to be able to hold our signature event in May – Sunnykids Wine Makers Master Class – backed by the fabulous Travis Schultz, which saw much needed funds injected into our schools' program and meant we were able to add an additional 12 programs directly from these funds.

Unfortunately, the statistics surrounding why organisations like SunnyKids exist are horrendous.

Almost one in 10 Australian women in a relationship has experienced domestic violence.

Based on this, just about everyone reading this report knows someone who has been affected by family and domestic violence. The increase in services from Sunnykids could be very literally life-saving for someone experiencing this type of violence.

The Sunnykids team are to be commended for their flexibility and resilience as they navigated these times. Led by Kathleen Hope, I believe we are now positioned more effectively than ever to make a difference. Kathleen has led the team with passion, purpose and integrity through a time that was anything but business as usual.

How we help

SunnyKids Cooroy Family Support Centre

At the Cooroy Family Support Centre we support women and children who have experienced domestic and family violence. This can be in the form of historical experiences or current significant safety concerns. Through strategic case management, staff assist service users to identify and respond to 5 key areas of concern in order to have the opportunity to live a life free from violence and recover from trauma.

We believe that by addressing issues such as homelessness, substance use

and mental health concerns to name a few, individuals are more likely to have safe and nurturing relationships, good health and wellbeing, be successful in education, feel culturally connected and have economic stability. This is achieved through referral pathways to relevant specialist services, onsite counselling, safety planning, risk management, case coordination and wellbeing workshops.

The significant impacts of domestic and family violence cannot be underestimated and the plethora of intersecting barriers and considerations can often become so overwhelming and difficult to navigate that further harm and dysfunction can follow.

Year after year SunnyKids supports women and children who have experienced heartbreaking and debilitating abuse. This support is provided with accommodation in a refuge setting. It can be hard to imagine what it looks like in a refuge.

Najidah

Many families come to us with nothing more than a bag of clothes. Children who are torn away from their homes, schools, friends and community.

SunnyKids works hard to engage community partnerships who provide essential items like clothing, hygiene products and school books.

A fresh start often comes with a heavy price and the Sunshine Coast Village rally together to lend a hand without ever seeing who the recipients are.

SunnyKids in partnership with State Government and the Department of Justice and Attorney General provided 9303 nights of accommodation to 36 women and 99 children during the 2020 - 2021 financial year.

of abuse and alcohol. The staff supported Emily in obtaining a DVO, setting up weekly visitations with her daughter, and finding appropriate housing that she and her daughter could move to.

Emily made real progress in ensuring she stayed on the right track, and overnight stays with Daisy were eventually granted. When appropriate accommodation was found through a local community and affordable housing group, she was able to move in with her daughter and enrol her in the local primary school. In her last meeting with staff, Emily noted Daisy's new found energy and smile now that she had a safe and caring home environment.

Though success is not always straightforward, being in the Najidah refuge gave Emily the courage and support to leave the lifelong cycle of abuse, and achieve personal goals of independence and happiness.

Emily's story

Emily had lost her daughter Daisy (4) to Child Safety, due to her involvement with alcohol and a domestically violent partner. She entered the refuge, knowing big changes would need to be made to bring her daughter back.

For 7 years, Emily's partner subjected her to financial, verbal and emotional abuse. Any money she earned was returned straight back to him, for fear of punishment. The abusive lifestyle sucked Emily in to a life of alcoholism, and Daisy was removed from the home. This seemed to be the perpetual cycle; years before, she'd lost other children to Child Safety due to other perpetrators in her life. Losing Daisy was the drive she needed to make drastic changes and leave.

Entering the SunnyKids domestic and family violence centre (Najidah) was the first step in leaving behind the cycle

Jade's story

Jade was referred to SunnyKids by the police, following a violation of a DV order where her husband of 35 years had made threats of physical harm to both her and the family dog. A long string of offences, including aggression towards their adult children and verbal and financial abuse, had led to the initial DV order in 2018. Her relationships with family and friends had deteriorated following the DV order, as her husband's behaviour had become more controlling; the Covid pandemic lockdown also restricted her interactions with outside support. Matters were complicated by the couple's cohabitation at their joint residence, despite being separated.

The Cooroy Family Support Centre team worked with Jade to identify her main goals- independence, safety, and reconnection with a support network of friends and family.

Local legal aid advised her of her rights to reside in the property, but also maintained the focus on her safety. Jade found this empowering, as her husband often threatened to make her homeless. She also connected with a local Aboriginal service to help connect with her culture.

Her current goal is to sell the house that she and her husband live in, to enable the independence she has been craving for many years. Whilst she cannot yet be totally free of him, Jade has taken classes on self-assertion and awareness of Domestic and Family Violence, which she says has given her more power in her own home. Even in her current circumstances, the future looks bright, and she looks forward to moving forward with her two children in their new lives.





Kate's story

Kate was suffering under the stress of caring for multiple independents whilst retired. She had recently been given custody of her three grandchildren (CC, Laura and Will), due to their parents' substance addiction. Her husband was also recently diagnosed with cancer, and Kate needed guidance as to how to obtain financial and emotional support in this tumultuous time.

Upon liaison with a school representative, Kate was referred to SKIS. With support from the SunnyKids staff, she was better able to connect with financial supports through Centrelink and local charities, as well as counselling to deal with her husband's diagnosis. Will and CC had

become shy and withdrawn since the removal from their parents, and both also received counselling assistance.

With the support received, Kate felt better prepared to care for the children, and even took parenting classes. CC and Will began to show interest in school again; Will joined Karate, ensuring he was surrounded by positive role models.

SunnyKids still keeps in touch with Kate and the children. Life has improved- the children are adapting to the new dynamic nicely, and are happy that their grandad is successfully recovering at home.

Sunnykids mentoring through sports

SunnyKids and the Brisbane Broncos collaborate to deliver the Mentoring Through Sports program in Sunshine Coast schools, with former Broncos player Jack Reed (Broncos/Sunshine Coast Game Development Officer) facilitating the program.

These schools select 10 children (male and female) who identify as at risk of disengagement. This can present as social and emotional challenges, self-esteem issues, confidence/lack of confidence, risk taking behaviours and absenteeism including academic delays.

These 10 children will be part of one group who will participate in a sporting program with a difference. The main focus and messaging within MTS is to deliver 8 sessions onsite with a focus on 3 key areas –

- Healthy Relationships – identifying respect in communication including social media awareness.
- Core Values – promoting an understanding of “Self and Health”.
- Physical development and health – clearer understanding of mental and physical health and wellbeing.

SunnyKids staff attend a number of sessions to assist with any relevant support needed for both facilitators and children. Where appropriate families may benefit from additional case coordination support and this may be facilitated by SunnyKids.

This program has had enormous success to date in a number of schools across the Sunshine Coast.

Common themes gathered through evaluation from students and teachers include:

- Increased sense of self-worth and confidence.
- Healthy management of anger and conflict.
- Better understanding of health and nutrition and wellbeing.

The Sunshine Coast continue to support SunnyKids to deliver this program to as many children as possible.

Sunnykids In Schools (SKIS)

SunnyKids aims to break inter-generational cycles of poverty and disadvantage, providing the hope and resilience necessary to move forward, both as individuals and as a society.

SKIS supports children with social/emotional barriers to education through school based capacity building, asset based community development and service co-ordination.

SKIS links schools, families and support service systems to provide practical, needs based responses to the issues faced by families; thereby ensuring children have an opportunity to reach their full potential in their education.

The SunnyKids SKIS program is a value add to the comprehensive student support services currently

in partner schools. By working together we can address and reduce the potential for disengagement from school and build capacity for families to prioritise educational needs.

SunnyKids provides a range of specialist support and intervention programs working closely with other non-government and government agencies.

SunnyKids are committed to providing opportunities in accepting environments for children, young people and families and supporting them to build capacity to navigate challenges and manage their own lives.

Financials

2020, the year that defied all rational logic. As an accountant and a lover of clarity, structure and process, FY2020-21 was not looking good for me. Despite the turmoil, and my personal selfishness in wanting stability for financials, I am very pleased to announce my final set of results as Treasurer for SunnyKids are more favourable than ever and SunnyKids are set up in the best position possible to assist those in need.

As we started the year knowing the almighty donation dollar would be scarce and the fact we were unable to hold key events through FY2020-21, SunnyKids became increasingly reliant on its government funds to maintain operations, continue service delivery and, respond to the 15% increase in demand for individuals requiring support.

Thankfully we were able to achieve some stability with our year-on-year revenue as total revenue achieved \$1.68m for the year. Amazingly, this was up 7.9% from FY2019-20. For the FY20-21 year, 68% of total revenue (including Covid19 Government support), was attributable to Government funding - an increase of 15% from historic averages of 53%. Amazing support from our State and Local Governments provided additional funding for our Najidah refuge, plus one-off Council Grants as well as Job Keeper allowed us to maintain Service Delivery operations through these uncertain times. I would like to extend a massive thanks to everyone who contributed to the wonderful Winemakers Master Class delivering \$161k towards services in June 2021. These combined contributions allowed for amplified service delivery activities as hoped for at the start of the year.

The requirement to pivot significantly through the year meant we needed to ensure scarce funds were being allocated directly to those in need. This pivoting resulted in a significant reduction in overhead costs driven by a fundraising cost saving of \$262k year-on-year. In addition, team restructuring completed late in

FY2019-20 allowed for a \$100k expense saving year-on-year. Combined, this meant that FY20-21 saw 70% of operational costs assigned to service delivery activities, which is an increase of 10% from a historic average of total spending.

Combining our ability to maintain our revenue base and reduce overhead expenses, SunnyKids achieved a phenomenal \$550k of operating profit for the year. This profit position has meant that whilst we look towards the future and see Covid19 continuing to both hamper our service delivery abilities and rapidly increasing the demand for our services at the same time, we have the ability to be innovative in our approach and platforms. This has already led to increasing our service delivery team base well beyond previous financial years plus, provide asset improvements including playground and refuge upgrades within our facilities. Working with our local Councils we hope to increase the number of days our service facilities stay open from half a week to a full week, which was previously cost prohibitive.

Now it is time for the sun to set on my tenure with SunnyKids and I reflect on the changes that have occurred throughout this time. From a finance perspective, I am very proud of the growth we have seen in our processes and internal structures strengthening our governance and reporting abilities. Getting nerdy for a second, moving from cash accounting (kiddy) to accrual accounting (adult) was a massive and much needed challenge that happened early on. In regards to fundraising

activities, not just delivering but funding and backing significant fundraising events including the Mayoral Ball & Winemakers is not something many organisations have had the privilege of achieving. All this was done while at the same time continuing to maintain lean operations always with a focus to limit bloating administration cost so maximum funds could be attributed to where they are needed most. These are just a few of the many achievements reached by SunnyKids that I am very proud of.

I would again as always like to thank the amazing individuals I have had the pleasure of working with over the past 5 years. A whole-hearted 'thank you' to our key Platinum, Gold, Silver and Bronze Partners for their continued support both financially and through their donation of time and energy.

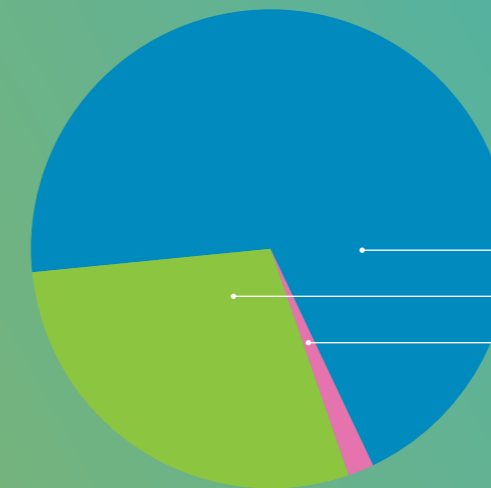

Sunnykids' five keys to wellbeing



Economic stability

SunnyKids works to ensure economic stability by building families capacity to better cope with the stressors of everyday living.

We find that the critical factors to economic stability are frequently correlated to other factors. Examples include people paying nightly rent for caravans because they are black listed from the rental system, loss of employment due to unresolved health needs of family members – including children and adults. On the journey to economic stability we provide support to ensure sustainability.

Cultural connectedness

SunnyKids works to support cultural connectedness by assisting families to engage with their culture and community of choice.



Due to significant over representation of Aboriginal, Torres Strait Islander, Australian South Sea Islander and other Culturally and Linguistically Diverse participants in our services the Board has established the SunnyKids Aboriginal and Cultural sub-committee which proactively enhances cultural sensitivity and builds organisational connections, links and partnerships to assist in cultural connectedness of these particular people groups.

However SunnyKids also recognises that all people need cultural connectedness and are therefore proactive in supporting all participants regardless of culture or community of choice to develop a strong sense of belonging and connectedness in their community.



Success in education

Quality learning experiences, particularly from 0 – 12 lay the foundation for children's future success in school and life. As is the case with SunnyKids Health Partnerships we have developed extensive networks across Education Providers from day care through to tertiary institutions. Since 2005 we have been facilitating partnerships between schools, families and other service providers.



Health and wellbeing

Since 2005, SunnyKids has been coordinating services across Government Departments including QLD Health which has led to a mature network of health provider partners. Today SunnyKids partners strategically with private and public child and family health services on the Sunshine Coast.

These services including Paediatricians and allied health services such as Psychologists, Occupational Therapists and Speech Therapists who have identified their need to work with SunnyKids to deliver targeted and intensive services for vulnerable families or for those children where a health or development need is identified.



Safe and nurturing relationships

The factors most commonly associated with the occurrence of child abuse and neglect are domestic violence, parental substance use and parental mental health concerns. These types of issues are complex, often inter-related, and chronic in nature and rarely occur in isolation.

Through SunnyKids direct support and network partners, a range of supports are offered to ensure a coordinated, effective response to these inter-related case complexities.

Corporate partnership and fundraising

Incorporates -P100, Corporate Partners, Community Grants, and SunnyKids local child sponsorship program.

Businesses and individuals in the community support SunnyKids financially through ongoing partnerships, singular donations and grants.

P100 members are a group of philanthropic and like-minded business people who commit a minimum of \$100 monthly to enable the sustainable delivery of SunnyKids services. The SunnyKids Local Child Sponsorship Program provides a platform for families, community groups, sporting teams, businesses
