SHAME MUST CHANGE SIDES!



“It’s not for us (survivors) to have shame. It’s for them. Shame must change sides.”

GISELE PELICOT

“Shame must change sides” – these words, spoken by Gisele Pelicot in France during 2024, not only represent her call for justice but have also become words that should be imprinted into every cell of our being as an inherent truth. If we fully embrace these words, they have the potential to alter the course of social relationships.

By taking such a public stance for justice, Gisele Pelicot demonstrates to all of us that true change must begin with an internal shift, a shift where blame changes sides and survivors regain their power and are finally heard. Speaking openly about abuse can help to create a culture where abusers can’t hide and where survivors feel supported. Changes to laws in Australia make it easier for survivors to speak out about their experiences while at the same time the law will still protect the privacy of those who do not wish to be identified.

For the first time in recent memory, our society is saying “I believe you.” The responsibility for change lies with all of us, beginning with ourselves and our collective accountability. This can be incredibly positive and powerful as it can abolish stereotypes about who experiences abuse, help others recognise abuse in their own relationships, and show that there is life after abuse. However, it is also important to recognise that speaking out can leave women feeling exposed and bring about unexpected consequences, so support and care for emotional wellbeing and safety is essential for deep healing to become possible, both individually and socially.

About this Report

In this year’s Impact Report, we shine the light on activities made possible by generous partners, donors and supporters for the period 1 July 2024 to 30 June 2025. We are dedicated to helping children and adults live a life to its full potential by interrupting violence, repairing historical trauma, educating the community and preparing for a future where violence doesn’t exist. The theme of our report this year – Shame Must Change Sides – echoes growing public awareness about abuse. In the case of Gisele Pelicot in France, news coverage completely refrained from victim-blaming language.

As an organisation, SunnyKids wants to be in the best possible position to meet the evolving needs of families and children in Queensland. Throughout 2024–2025 we continued working toward our Strategic Plan which outlines our bold vision to achieve a community where everyone feels safe, belongs and has the chance to reach their full potential.

Message from Chief Executive Officer Kathleen Hope

Throughout 2024 we remained steadfast in supporting and advocating for children and families in times of crisis and planning for a safer future. We all know how domestic violence impacts the community and unfortunately for many of us we know of a story very close to home.

The awareness of domestic and family violence in our community continues to increase, its prevalence and consequences are no longer a hidden social issue. In recent years, media reporting on domestic violence has commonly been front page rather than a small, secreted story on page six. Its acceptability is being replaced by a growing social intolerance and an expectation that children and families seeking help will get it.

During the past year, the world was shocked by the heinous crimes committed in France against Gisele Pelicot who survived sexual violence and became an advocate for ending violence against women. Gisele's face was broadcast across the world as she bravely chose to waive her right to anonymity.

Ms Pelicot stated, "I wanted...to ensure that society could see what was happening...I now have faith in our capacity to collectively take hold of a future in which everybody...can live together in harmony, respect, and mutual understanding."

As CEO of SunnyKids I have enormous admiration for the strength and courage of this woman in going public with the case; her message that people should not be ashamed to speak out about sexual, or domestic violence, is very powerful. Her words have become a loud voice of advocacy for children and families impacted by DFSV and the theme of this report – Shame must change sides!

This year we have continued our work to ensure survivors are supported and their

voice is heard. Together we are making a difference and as I reflect on 2024/2025, the progress we've made highlights the strength of our partnerships, the dedication of our team and the impact of working together toward our shared vision. I acknowledge the experienced and skilled SunnyKids' Board, led by Chair John Burnie, for their ongoing guidance and support and I am proud to present this year's report on our achievements, highlights and plans for the future as we continue to make a difference in the lives of children and families in our community.

Our Impact – Amy's Story

Amy was referred to SunnyKids by a Centrelink support worker assisting her with payment eligibility. We contacted Amy to offer support after learning she was experiencing intense fear, anxiety, and distress due to her ex-partner's attempted break-in and threats to kill her, which breached the existing DVO. Her ex had been stalking her and threatening self-harm since their breakup and had not accepted the end of their relationship. Feeling unsafe in her own home, Amy arranged to stay with friends.

SunnyKids provided strategic planning and risk assessment, obtaining Amy's consent to coordinate with key services for her safety. We worked with Qld Corrective Services, QPS, and Qld Health to enhance her protection. SunnyKid's staff supported Amy with safety planning, security upgrades, and an application to the Victims Register. Throughout the case, we offered DV education, counselling, and referrals for relevant health services and ongoing therapeutic support.

While Amy still faces the possibility of relocating due to ongoing threats, she has maintained her job, and her child continues to regularly attend school due to ongoing support from SunnyKids to keep her safe in her home.

Our Impact
– Claire's Story

When Claire first called SunnyKids, she was desperate. Originally from overseas, she had come to Australia for a long holiday and found herself in a controlling relationship that quickly escalated into abuse. During her pregnancy, Claire's partner coerced her into isolation, forced her to quit her job, and physically assaulted her, including repeated strangulation. After their baby was born, the violence reached a terrifying peak and it was only through the quick actions of hospital staff that police intervened, removing her partner and issuing a temporary protection order.

But the challenges didn't end there. Her ex-partner stopped paying rent, withdrew her visa application and blocked her from securing a passport for her baby. While there was no vacancy with SunnyKid's accommodation we secured a safe refuge space where Claire and her baby could be cared for.

Today, Claire and her baby are thriving in secure accommodation and receiving ongoing support. She is hopeful about her immigration outcome and optimistic about building a safe, stable life for her family. With SunnyKids walking alongside her, what once felt impossible has become a future filled with hope.

The kids and I were excited to be walking into our new house yesterday, but instead of walking into our new house, we got to walk into our new home. Last night tucking the kids into their own rooms knowing we had a home and that we weren't alone was the most at peace I have felt in a very long time.

A Year of Growth, Generosity and Impact

What a tremendous year it has been, filled with exciting highlights and remarkable generosity.

We had budgeted for breakeven result for the year to fund the expansion of services into Moreton Bay, as part of our strategic plan. Instead, throughout the year we were very fortunate to welcome a new philanthropist into our Village who has been instrumental in supporting our Transitional Housing project by generously matching some of our fundraising efforts throughout the year.

Our assets grew significantly thanks to the extraordinary donation of a large parcel of land in central Maroochydore. The gift together with the construction of 3 x 3 bedroom townhouses, will deliver on our vision for Transitional Housing providing hope for families in need through the exceptional generosity of Firefly Education.

The year was busy and rewarding year for our Business Development Team with our signature events including:

- **The Mayoral Ball** celebrating our 25th anniversary with Jelena Dokic as our inspiring keynote speaker.
- **The Travis Schultz Winemakers Masterclass backed by NAB Private Wealth for SunnyKids** which raised and outstanding \$208,211.
- **Other fundraising events** held throughout the year included our, \$100k Challenge, Kart-a-Thon, White Lies Burlesque, Double R Race Night and our inaugural Melbourne Cup Luncheon.

We also launched exciting new fundraising events:

- **The Fincierge Race Day** in partnership with Altitude Scholarships (May)
- **The Travis Schultz Noosa Winemaker Lunch for SunnyKids powered by McClure Prestige Luxury Real Estate** (July).

Total operating inflow (excluding extraordinary income) year on year increased 33 % to \$2.5 million (2024 \$1.88 million) with the growth attributable to additional government and community funding. In addition, we received an extraordinary donation of land and funding to the value of \$3.5 million for the year. This improved our net assets significantly by 224% to \$5.25 million.

Our operating expenses rose in line with the additional government funding and Domestic and Family Violence (DFV) worker grant, primarily through increased salary and wage costs to expand service delivery and support new fundraising initiatives.

While we budgeted for a strategic loss to fund our expansion into Moreton Bay, we are proud to report a significant profit of \$133, 952 (excluding extraordinary income) for the year. This outcome has strengthened our healthy cash reserves, positioning us to be able to invest in future projects and support ongoing strategic growth and ensuring continuity of service delivery even during funding gaps.

Looking ahead, we are excited about the Transitional Housing project,

scheduled for completion in early 2026. This development will deliver a total of 6 x 3 bedroom townhouses in Maroochydore, providing medium term accommodation for families moving on from crisis housing as they begin to rebuild their lives. This year also saw major investments in strengthening our systems. We implemented a high grade client management system to capture data across all programs, improving impact measurement, cyber security and client data protection. In addition, our new cloud based Human Resources platform has increased efficiency and enhanced reporting.

We close 2025 in a strong financial position, with exciting projects coming to completion in the near future and a continued commitment to expanding services in the Moreton Bay region.

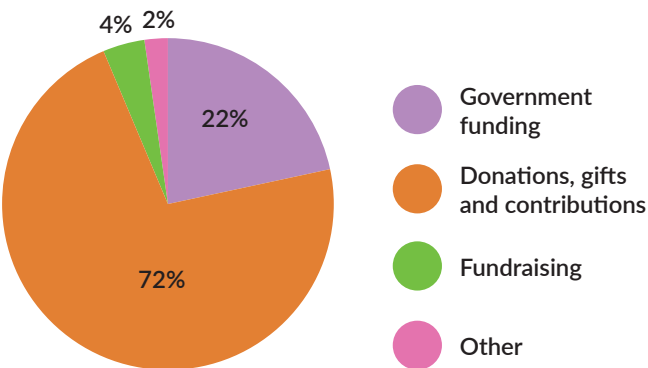

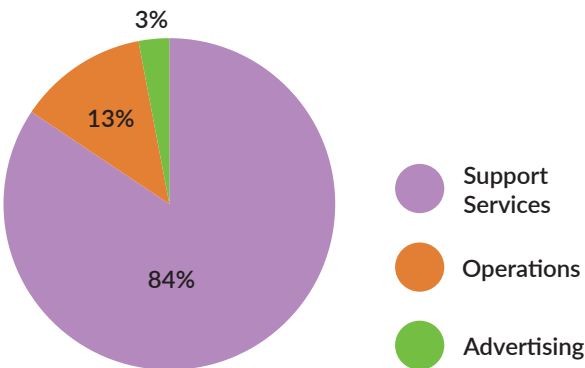

Our Impact – Callan's Story

When teachers noticed 12-year-old Callan was struggling to concentrate and often arriving at school without enough food, they reached out to SunnyKids. A meeting with his mum revealed the heartbreaking truth: she was struggling to balance the rising cost of rent, bills and groceries and simply couldn't provide enough.

SunnyKids immediately connected her with local services offering affordable groceries. The change was almost immediate. Callan began arriving at school with nutritious lunches, his concentration improved, and he stopped frequently coming to the office for food.

Beyond food security, SunnyKids also helped Callan's mum look for more

affordable rental that reduced financial pressure and allowed her to better provide for her children.

For Callan, the difference has been life changing. With a full stomach and a more stable home he is now able to focus on being a kid, learning, growing, and thriving at school.

OUR SUPPORT FOR FAMILIES



Najidah Refuge

The SunnyKids' Najidah Refuge is funded by the Queensland Government and Department of Families, Seniors, Disability Services and Child Safety (previously Department of Justice and Attorney General) with the Sunshine Coast community partnering with SunnyKids to provide essential items (e.g. clothing, linen, hygiene products, schoolbooks).

The SunnyKids' Team uses a strategic Case Management model to identify and respond to individual needs. The team also implements the SunnyKids 5 Keys to Wellbeing framework – Economic Stability; Cultural Awareness; Success in Education; Health and Wellbeing; and Safe and Nurturing Relationships and provides access to counselling services when needed.

At the SunnyKids' Refuge, families are provided with direct assistance and support and given referral pathways to build their capacity to care for children away from violence.

To take care of, feed and protect someone or something especially young children and help them to develop.



Cooroy Family Support Centre

The SunnyKids' Cooroy Family Support Centre is located in Noosa Shire and provides support for families in the community who have experienced or continue to experience domestic violence.

A volunteer clinical child psychologist provides families with parenting workshops and SunnyKids' staff provide direct assistance, support and appropriate referral pathways, manage risk, triage crisis interventions and respond to individual needs.

The SunnyKids' 5 Keys to Wellbeing framework – Economic Stability; Cultural Awareness; Success in Education; Health and Wellbeing; and Safe and Nurturing Relationships underpin all the support provided and the Centre is funded through Department of Families, Seniors, Disability Services and Child Safety (previously Department of Justice and Attorney General), Noosa Shire Council and community fundraising.

Queensland Police Service connects individuals and families with the service or individuals can self-report or refer through other community agencies. Cooroy RSL, Cooroy Masons, Cooroy Lions Club and Zonta Noosa are active and very supportive community groups.

Our Impact – Leena's Story

Leena contacted SunnyKids after a local business providing legal advice and support referred her to us. Sunnykids supported Leena with case management and DFV counselling after learning she was experiencing overwhelming distress, fear and anxiety. Leena had also suffered severe head injuries, concussion, and breathing difficulties after an acute strangulation. Leena's daughter had also witnessed the incident and found Leena

unconscious on the floor in her blood. Over several years, Leena had endured verbal and psychological abuse from her partner and was afraid of leaving because of threats of violence and tracking on Leena's devices.

SunnyKids supported Leena to provide a statement to police, complete a risk assessment, develop a plan, access medical care and implement immediate

safety upgrades. SunnyKids also supported Leena with Child Safety, therapy options for her daughter, access to ongoing support and in liaising with her daughter's school.

Leena has shared with us that she is determined to end the cycle of violence for her daughter and create healthy opportunities for their family.

OUR SUPPORT FOR FAMILIES



Save a Life Tonight (SALT)

The SunnyKids' Save a Life Tonight (SALT) campaign was established in 2022 to provide early intervention for families and a circuit breaker to a potentially harmful situation before it escalates into an incident of family violence.

SunnyKids' SALT program provides immediate access to a night of hotel accommodation, food and necessities and aims to avoid potential trauma through access to safety planning and way forward for the future.

Access to SALT may be gained through self-referral, Queensland Police, Queensland Ambulance Service officers and others who attend incidents. Staff are on call to provide access to the emergency accommodation and a Safety Plan if required.

The SunnyKids' SALT program is funded through sponsorship with a \$300 donation providing one night of accommodation in a safe location. Local Sunshine Coast businesses and community groups support the program with essential items such as food, basic hygiene needs and linen.



Noosa Satellite Service

When SunnyKids identified the need for an outreach service in the Noosa area local P100 village supporters stepped up and provided a shared, rent-free office space in Noosa Junction.

The Noosa Satellite Service provides ongoing direct assistance, support and appropriate referral pathways, risk management and triage crisis interventions to individuals and families in the Noosa community.



Legal Support

SunnyKids staff use their working knowledge of systems in both the Justice and Legal departments to provide confidence to clients navigating crisis. SunnyKids brings in experts who are trusted and knowledgeable across criminal, domestic violence and family law to ensure clients are informed of their rights, options and pathways to bring stability back into their lives.

Support can also involve: accompanying victim survivors to court for emotional support; safety planning for court appearances; navigating complexities of the legal system: accompaniment to legal appointments to support understanding and advocacy: and where approved, support with mediation processes.



Connecting with Support

SunnyKids provides essential support services to children and families experiencing domestic and family violence and hardship. Our integrated support network provides a range of life-saving services to thousands of families in Queensland each year.

SunnyKids believes that it takes a village to raise a child and in doing so, works tirelessly with local communities to help educate and break the cycle of violence and hardship to create a future where this doesn't exist.

To do this, we provide a social and emotional safety net for thousands of children and their families through partnerships with health and education service providers. Our unique Virtual Village practice model provides wrap-around support services to children and their families.



Transitional Housing

A transitional home is a housing option for families after they leave the SunnyKids' Najidah Refuge. At SunnyKids, we believe it is crucial to provide families with safe, stable housing as they transition towards independent living.

SunnyKids' Transitional Houses provide safe and secure accommodation that is medium-term in its nature. This wouldn't be possible without the support of Firefly Education; they built a legacy which will support thousands.

I find the Sunny Kids support service a valuable resource to assist victims of Domestic Violence. The relationship between the Queensland Police Service and the SunnyKids support service is exceptional. SunnyKids is always happy to assist with QPS enquiries and give us assistance to better enhance the safety of the victims.

Mentoring Through Sport (MTS)

SunnyKids and the Brisbane Broncos Rugby League Football Club work together to deliver the SunnyKids' Mentoring Through Sports (MTS) programs in schools across multiple regions.

The MTS program is designed to develop skills and mentor the children who participate with a focus on: Healthy Relationships – identifying the importance of respect in all communication including social media; Core Values – promoting an understanding of “Self and Health”; Physical Development and Health – developing a clearer understanding of mental and physical health and wellbeing.

The SunnyKids' MTS program supports children who have been identified by their school as at risk of disengagement from schooling. Past Bronco players deliver the 8 sessions across a term and are supported by SunnyKids' staff.

This very successful program aims to drive changes in the attitude and behaviour of young people in our community.



SunnyKids in Schools (SKIS)

SunnyKids and schools work together to help all children have an opportunity to reach their full potential through their educational journey. The SKIS program supports children within the school environment who may need a little extra guidance or a helping hand. The SunnyKids in Schools (SKIS) program is designed for children who may exhibit social or emotional barriers to education. Support through this program extends to the child's family to provide 'wrap-around' support.

Businesses and organisations support the work of SunnyKids in delivering SKIS to as many children as possible and the program helps to link schools, families and service support systems to ensure a practical and needs based response is given to issues faced by families.

SunnyKids also works with schools to help address and reduce potential disengagement from school and add value to the very comprehensive student support services that are already in place in partner schools.

Our Impact – Paula’s Story

When Paula and her children were referred to SunnyKids they were living in DFV crisis accommodation, trying to rebuild their lives after family violence. Despite the challenges, Paula never stopped fighting for her family's safety and stability. She tirelessly advocated for housing while building a network of supports around her children.

SunnyKids walked alongside Paula, advocating with the Department of Housing and ensuring her children had the right supports in place. Her eldest child was linked with mentoring to focus on personal and professional goals,

while her youngest began counselling to learn tools for self-regulation and emotional wellbeing.

Then, the breakthrough came. Paula phoned SunnyKids with the news she had long been waiting for; she and her family had been accepted into Department of Housing. The relief in her voice said it all. Paula expressed her deep appreciation for SunnyKids, sharing that this support had been the difference between despair and hope. With a safe home and the right wraparound supports, her family now has the foundation to heal and thrive.



OUR SUPPORT FOR CHILDREN

SunnyKids in Early Education (SKEE)

The SunnyKids' in Early Education (SKEE) program aims to reverse the impact of Domestic and Family Violence before it becomes too late.

SKEE provides early intervention in Early Education Centres across the Sunshine Coast, Moreton and Gympie Regions. The program aims to address the experiences of young children and their potential for disengagement from schooling and be part of a holistic care response for children and adults.

SKEE is designed to connect people and link centres and schools with appropriate support service systems. The Program also supports the practical, needs based responses to the issues faced by families and assist with identifying what a child/family needs and where to find the right services.

Through the SKEE Program, SunnyKids staff assist with navigating the network of support available to families and children.

Christmas Gift Appeal

The SunnyKids' Sunny Christmas for Kids appeal aims to provide support that extends far beyond the festive season, offering hope and healing for children in crisis.

For many children supported by SunnyKids, Christmas is not a time of joy and celebration, instead it is a painful reminder of what they don't have – the gifts they won't receive, and the brokenness in their homes. Sadly, Christmas highlights

the trauma they face year-round. The holiday period can be especially difficult as children, trapped in cycles of abuse, experience heightened stress and instability.

SunnyKids' Christmas Gift Appeal – Sunny Christmas for Kids helps to provide age-appropriate gifts that bring joy to children in our community who are most in need.



Our Impact – Heather's Story

Heather was recommended to our service by a family member who had been providing Heather with emotional support. SunnyKids engaged with Heather to provide case management and DFV counselling after learning she was experiencing overwhelming distress, fear and anxiety due to her partner's coercive control behaviours and threats of suicide. Heather had been enduring verbal and psychological abuse from her partner for 2 years and experienced barriers to leaving because her disability

impacted her financial independence and capacity. Heather wanted to leave but didn't know how.

SunnyKids staff provided support with how Heather envisioned leaving, liaised with relevant services to assist with financial barriers to leaving and assisted with establishing financial independency. SunnyKids supported with safety planning, security upgrades and an application for support through Uniting Care as well as DFV education,

counselling, and referrals for relevant health services and ongoing therapeutic support.

Heather successfully obtained a housing opportunity via private rental and was able to leave. Her main goal was to obtain stable, healthy living circumstances and show her daughter that breaking the cycle of domestic violence is achievable with the right support.

Professional Development Programs

Business and Corporate

SunnyKids provides a range of professional development programs for Corporate and Business groups on the Sunshine Coast and across the Moreton and Gympie regions.

The programs, presented for free by SunnyKids' staff, provide Domestic and Family Violence (DFV) alert training for frontline workers and help employees and managers recognise DFV, respond to disclosures safely, refer people to support services, and assist in fostering a safer workplace.

The programs are provided face to face and teach employees and managers how to:

- **Recognise:** signs of domestic and family violence.
- **Respond:** appropriately to someone who is experiencing DFV.
- **Refer:** individuals to appropriate support services.

An extensive range of program topics is available to support Businesses and Corporations.

Schools

SunnyKids provides free, face to face training programs for school staff across primary, secondary and special schools in the State and private sector.

The program is delivered in a safe and respectful way and defines Domestic and Family Violence (DFV) and SunnyKids' role in supporting families. Participants will consider how to support and respond to a colleague who may be experiencing DFV, how to start a conversation and consider strategies to support all employees at the school.

Participants reflect on the impact of DFV on children by unpacking the characteristics of key generations and the impact of social media.

Other programs including the impact of trauma on children are also available.



Cooroy Family Support Centre – Noosa Council and Cooroy RSL

A major renovation was undertaken at our Cooroy Family Support Centre that saw the centre transformed into a modern, light-filled, calm space. This project involved the demolition of an old counselling room and the repurposing of an old storage room into a counselling room. The garden area was also given a wonderful facelift that enhanced the whole building.

This renovation would not have been possible without the generous support of the Noosa Council and Cooroy RSL both of whom provided funding through financial grants for the project.



Cooroy Family Support Centre – Northern Community Training Centre

In our work to renovate the Cooroy Family Support Centre we were honoured to receive over 700 hours of manual labour from the Northern Community Training Centre. The generosity of this group enabled us to transform the facility and make it into an inviting and welcoming Support Centre for families and children in the community who have been impacted by domestic and family violence.



Gambling Community Benefit Fund Support

During the past financial year SunnyKids received a Gambling Community Benefit Fund of \$89,000. This funding was used to help reduce our environmental impact and reduce annual costs incurred by our organisation.

Funding was used to:

- Purchase a new vehicle for our small fleet. The grant from GCBF enabled the purchase of a hybrid vehicle.
- Installation of solar panels at Najidah Refuge funded through a Gambling Community Benefit Fund grant. A solar battery was also provided through a grant from the National Australia Bank (NAB).

We are most appreciative of this support from the Community Gambling Benefit Fund as we strive to make a difference in the lives of children and families in our community.

Our Impact – Lucy's story

When Lucy fled an abusive relationship and had nowhere to go, she contacted SunnyKids. With only the clothes on her back and a bag of items for her children, Lucy was withdrawn and traumatised. Initially SunnyKids helped her to feel protected and safe, and the children received the psychological support they needed. SunnyKids assisted Lucy and her children with clothes, food and toys, a DV safe phone and assistance to access government support and to liaise with the children's school and NDIS.

Over the coming months SunnyKids linked Lucy with support groups and helped her establish a circle of friends she could trust and call on. Understanding the cycles of domestic violence enabled Lucy to unpack the patterns of intimate partner violence which was important for Lucy to find a more meaningful relationship by recognising the early warning signs.

Surviving years of abuse from multiple partners, Lucy and her three children left our care different people, confident, empowered and supported.

OUR COMMUNITY ADVOCACY



Domestic and Family Violence Month – Candlelight Vigil and March

Don't stand by, stand up!

SunnyKids and the Sunshine Coast community united in a powerful display of solidarity, standing with victims of domestic and family violence at the annual march and candlelight vigil at Cotton Tree Park.

The theme this year, “Don’t Stand By – Stand Up!”, resonated deeply with all members of the community who gathered at the corner of Cornmeal Parade and Horton Parade at 5pm on May 7, 2025. From there the group marched along the streets to the vigil site in Cotton Tree Park.

Sunshine Coast Council Mayor and SunnyKids’ Patron, Rosanna Natoli supported the vigil and acknowledged that, “Our community’s willingness to gather and march together sends a powerful message that domestic and family violence has no place in our community”.

The atmosphere was one of unity and determination as people of all ages and backgrounds walked together, holding signs and banners advocating for change, while the following candlelight vigil was a poignant moment for reflection and remembrance of victims of domestic violence.



Sunshine Coast Education Fair

The Sunshine Coast Education Fair is a free annual event for parents and students to explore various education options that are available for children and young people. The event brings together early learning, childcare, school, tutoring and tertiary education providers from across Southeast Queensland.

SunnyKids supports and participates in this event to showcase potential career pathways for students at secondary school and university. This enables families to discover new learning pathways and compare different educational pathways.



Euphoria Experience for Teens

Euphoria Experience Dance Party provides an opportunity for hundreds of teenagers to let their hair down and dance the night away in a fun and safe space.

SunnyKids and the event organisers create inclusive, safe and vibrant spaces for young people in our community to thrive and be themselves.



Increased Professional Development

SunnyKids offers professional development and training programs to a large range of organisations and groups.

These programs have been well received by corporate organisations, business groups and schools on the Sunshine Coast. Programs offered include Domestic and Family Violence in the Workplace; Intersectionality; Domestic and Family Violence impact in schools; Postmodernism; Why Won't She Just Leave, Help Me Understand; Strangulation; Sexual Harassment in the Workplace; Feminism-Misogyny; Developmental Lifespan Theory; and De-escalation.

Our Impact – Grace’s Story

Grace referred herself to SunnyKids when she had been given an ultimatum to leave by her partner or be forcefully removed from the home. SunnyKids identified that her partner had been physical violent for the past 10 years as well as severely coercive, limiting Grace's ability to work, connect with culture, have meaningful relationships or have independence with finances.

SunnyKids' staff supported Grace by connecting with key services for her safety, securing her bank accounts, connecting with Centrelink and Uniting Care for financial and other support

to access safe accommodation. SunnyKids coordinated a leaving plan and transported Grace to her new accommodation, provided DFV education, counselling, and referrals to other support services.

Grace successfully entered safe accommodation and has fled her violent partner. While Grace still faces a long journey to rebuild her independence, she can do so in a safe and supported environment. She is currently seeking employment and says she feels hope again.

Increased Geographic Support

As the need for support continues to grow in our community, SunnyKids' expansion of services continues to grow with it. Our expansion into new geographic regions is well underway and has proven to be very successful.

By expanding into new geographic areas, SunnyKids has been able to provide support to more families and children in need.

Our continued expansion of services requires careful research and planning to understand the new geographical areas, including cultural and language differences, regulatory requirements, community need, available services in the area and potential financial support.



Transitional Housing

In response to the growing housing crisis, SunnyKids is building six transitional townhouses on the Sunshine Coast to provide vulnerable families with a supported pathway from crisis to independence.

At SunnyKids we believe that access to safe, stable housing is critical for families escaping domestic and family violence and this program is supported by key community partners including Firefly Education, local philanthropists, legal experts, builders and service providers.

The first three houses are fully funded by Firefly Education and under construction. An additional three homes are currently in progress and will collectively provide 10,950 bed nights annually and help 60 individuals each year.

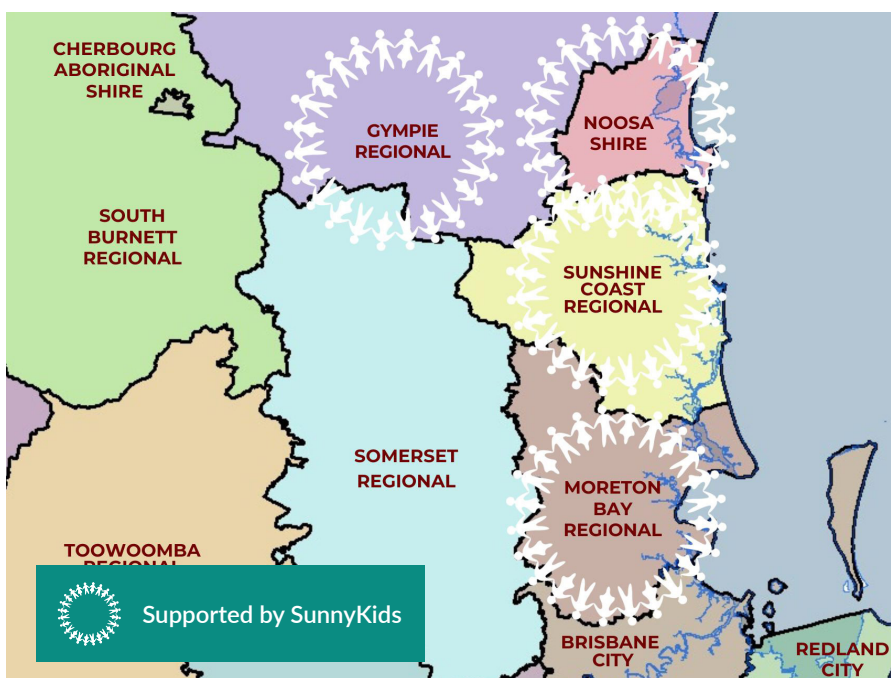


Commitment to Child Safe Standards

Queensland's Child Safe Organisation system has introduced 10 Child Safe Standards for businesses and organisations working with or providing spaces and facilities for anyone aged 17 years or younger. SunnyKids, along with other organisations, need to show they are child safe through meeting these Standards.

SunnyKids is fully committed to the National Child Safe Standards and the Child Safe Organisation Act 2024. This means we:

- Prioritise the safety and wellbeing of all children and young people in every aspect of our work.
- Ensure staff, volunteers, and stakeholders are trained, credentialed, and accountable to child safety.
- Provide physically and emotionally safe spaces across all our programs and services.
- Embed child safety into our governance, policies, and everyday practice.
- Actively listen to children's voices and empower them to contribute to decisions that affect their lives.
- We make this strategy visible by displaying it on our website and in all SunnyKids' offices and service delivery sites, affirming our promise to children and our accountability to the community.
- SunnyKids embraces the Standards, and the Universal Principle in a way that is specific to the SunnyKids' context. We continue to provide child safe responses in ways that protect Human Rights and the rights of children. Their voices matter.
